Introduction

- As one of the fastest growing economies in the region and in the world, Viet Nam is facing challenges such as improving the quality of its workforce to meet the needs of its economic development. Resolution 29-NQ/TW on radical and fundamental innovation in education indicated measures to improve the quality of higher education, enhancing research, and promoting innovation through internationalisation.
- Education is a key pillar in the UK Viet Nam strategic partnership and the UK is regarded as a preferred international partner as demonstrated by the Government-to-Government Education Memorandum of Understanding and the Memorandum of Collaboration between the British Council and the Ministry of Education and Training. Viet Nam is the third largest market for UK TNE in East Asia and in Viet Nam, the UK has the largest number of transnational education (TNE) programmes.
- The development of productive partnerships between UK-Viet Nam institutions will be essential for Viet Nam and UK knowledge economy to flourish. Transnational education is integral to positive education and scientific relations, and academic and student exchange between and within countries; it is most successful and sustainable when structured for mutual benefit.
- The British Council commits to support Viet Nam in their higher education reform agenda and implementation of Resolution 29-NQ/TW. Since 2021, the British Council has enabled 29 partnerships between 23 UK universities and 38 Viet Nam universities and organisations in response to MOET's priorities.
- This year, 2023 marks 50 years of UK-Viet Nam diplomatic relations and 30 years of the British Council in Viet Nam. This Forum will provide a platform for highlighting success stories of the UK-Viet Nam higher education partnerships during the past few years and creating opportunities for UK-Viet Nam HE partnerships in TNE to be developed further, both in breadth and depth.
- The British Embassy, the British Council and Ministry of Education and Training coorganise the UK-Viet Nam Higher Education Collaboration Forum on ThinkTNE – Leveraging UK-Viet Nam transnational education partnerships for HE leaders to:
 - Network meet existing and new partners and share knowledge.

 - Partner position the UK as a partner of choice for HE quality assurance and TNE, creating a platform to develop partnerships in teaching, learning and research.

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Opening remarks



Assoc Prof Dr Nguyen Van Phuc, Vice Minister, Ministry of Education and Training

Assoc Prof Dr Nguyen Van Phuc received his education in Viet Nam and the Netherlands. He is a leading expert in development economics and social economics. He has published many books and articles on these fields.

He started his career as a researcher at Ho Chi Minh City Institute for Development Studies in 1997. He has extensive academic and management experience in different positions including - Deputy Head of Development Research Centre at Ho Chi Minh City Institute for Development Studies;

Deputy Dean and then Dean of Economics Faculty of Ho Chi Minh Open University; Vice President and President of Ho Chi Minh Open University. He has received a number of awards and honours from national and international organisations and universities for his outstanding performance and service.

Dr Nguyen Van Phuc was appointed the Vice Minister of the Ministry Education and Training of Vietnam by the Prime Minister of Vietnam in September 2017. His portfolio includes international cooperation, science and technology, laws and regulations, digital transformation and IT application.



Prof Sir Steve Smith, UK Government International Education Champion

Professor Sir Steve Smith was appointed as the UK Government International Education Champion in June 2020, a new Government role aimed at boosting global education partnerships, He was also appointed as the Prime Ministers Special Representative for Education to Saudi Arabia in October 2020.

Sir Steve was the Vice-Chancellor and Chief Executive of the University of Exeter from October 2002 to August 2020. He was previously Professor of International Politics and the University of Wales, Aberystwyth, as well as

Head of the Department of International Politics, and Director of the Centre for Public Choice Studies at the University of East Anglia.

Education: He holds a BSc in Politics and International Studies, an MSc in International Studies, and a PhD in International Relations, all from Southampton University. He has also been awarded an Honorary DSc of the University of Southampton; an Honorary DEd at the University of the West of England; and is an Honorary Fellow of both Aberystwyth University and the University of Wales Institute, Cardiff. He is a Fellow of the Royal Society of Arts.

UK Higher Education sector: Sir Steve has held several prominent positions in the UK higher education sector. Most notably he was President of Universities UK (UUK), the representative body for the executive heads of UK universities, from 2009 to 2011; and Chair of the UCAS Board from 2013 to 2019.

From June 2007 to May 2010, he led for higher education on the Prime Minister's National Council of Excellence in Education, which provided advice to the Government about strategy and measured to

achieve world-class education performance for children and young people. He was also a member of the Institute for Public Policy Research's Commission on the Future of higher Education.

Sir Steve was knighted in the 2011 Queen's Birthday Honours for services to higher education locally and nationally. In 2019 he was awarded Freeman of the City of Exeter for his contribution to the city and local community.

He has started his role in Quality Assurance since 2018, and become the main organiser for all QA activities of the University.
